Treasurer's Ledger

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ:

As of January 31, 2009, the Church continues to have a negative financial position of \$4,098.35. Historically, we have been in a negative financial position in past Januarys. We should begin to be in the black beginning in February. The months February through April, are usually the months that we accumulate excess operating funds to carry us over the summer. Most of our Church's costs are fixed, such as, salaries, utilities, mortgage payments, and insurance. There are very few discretionary costs, but those that are, we will continue to slash to the bone.

All God's Children ended January 2009 with a small positive financial position of \$2,757.90.

Living Lord Initiates LLAMA Program

On February 11th, the Church Council approved a proposal to initiate the Living Lord Ambulatory Maintenance Assistance (LLAMA) Program within Living Lord Church.

What does LLAMA do?

It provides free Crutches, Canes, Walkers, and Wheelchairs to church members who have a temporary need for any of these items due to an injury or surgery.

What will it cost the church?

Nothing! All of the items received so far have been donated to Living Lord and we will solicit additional items as needed.

Where would these items be stored?

The Property Committee will make that decision..

How much storage space will be required?

The wheel chair and walkers are collapsible and require only two square feet of floor space total.

How would the program work? A member requiring one or more of these items would call the church office with their request. If that item is available, the member would pick it up at their convenience and return it when no longer needed.

What does the program accomplish?: It is a way for the church to reach out to its own members to spare them the expense of purchasing or renting equipment that may only be required for a short period of time. It's a win-win situation as it costs the church nothing but will certainly generate bountiful good will.

It is analogous to the Living Lord Disaster Hosting Program. In effect now for the fifth year, the Hosting Program has never been activated (due of course to the lack of local disasters) yet it offers a great comfort to know that it is in place and can be activated anytime there is a need. Likewise with LLAMA, we hope it does not have to be used often but it is there to help if there is a need.

Fire Shuts Down Living Lord

I see an active, vital church at Living Lord Lutheran. The longer I live the less I believe “It could never happen here” or “That could never happen to me”. We just never know what a new day will bring. Last Friday, January 30th, started out with a fire here at Living Lord Lutheran. The fire of the Holy Spirit would have been preferable. Instead, the fire was in our transformer box. It sits about ten feet from the AGC office and next to all our air conditioning units. Praise be to God, the building was spared any damage.

At about 7:45 AM while cleaning AGC for the day, I noticed that the transformer seemed to be steaming in the rain. I soon noticed that it was not steam but smoke. I then called Peace River Power Co. to report the problem. I checked it once more and it looked like a large BBQ grill with smoke rolling out. I then called 911 and reported the fire. Peace River called back and put an emergency call out. 911 phoned back and warned me about the danger of an electrical fire. I usually don't take calls that come in but that day I did.

A power crew was the first to arrive with the fire department right behind. As it turned out, the power crew was only a few blocks away. The firemen seemed very glad to have the power crew here. I have always been impressed with the very professional actions of the fire department and now I have a greater respect for Peace River Power's response. I first reported the problem at 7:45 AM and before noon they had installed a new transformer. The whole time they kept us informed of their progress.

The AGC teachers began to arrive while the firemen were still here. One of the teachers phoned Crystal Shreve, Assistant Director, while she was on her way. When she got here, the power company representative said, “No power until sometime this afternoon”. “No school today” was made official. The teachers and I met the parents as they arrived and turned them back. We have a great crew at AGC. They are very professional at all times and this was no exception. When you see one of them, give them a big hug.

With God's guidance, we can accomplish anything. It's our part to be ready for the challenge. We have fire and burglar alarms in place and plans for unexpected problems. It is our job to be diligent at all times. We should be ready expecting Christ's return at any time. “Be dressed ready for service and keep your lamps burning..... because the Son of Man will come at an hour when you do not expect him.”

Weather Corner

Arctic air brought the coldest temperatures in several years to much of Florida on January 21-22 and February 5-6. The coldest morning of the first freeze was on January 22 with local low temperatures as low as 31 at the Sarasota/Bradenton Airport, 29 in Parrish, and an unofficial 25 in Lakewood Ranch. Elsewhere in Florida, low temperatures on January 22 include Tallahassee 18, Cross City 19, Brooksville 20, Jacksonville 21, Plant City 23, Arcadia 25, Myakka River State Park 27, Ruskin 29, MacDill AFB 30, and Venice 32. Manatee County farmer Ben King lost his crop of tomatoes, peppers, eggplants, and jalapenos after the temperature dropped to 23 degrees for about four hours. About 80 acres were damaged despite attempts to warm the fields with water. Other farmers suffered little or no damage to their crops. There was minimal damage to the strawberry crop in the Plant City area with overnight watering for a 10-hour period.

Coldest local temperatures during the February freeze included 26 in Parrish and 31 at the Sarasota/Bradenton Airport. The record low of 14 at Tallahassee on February 5 was the coldest temperature there since 13 on December 24, 1989. The high temperature of 55 at Key West on February 5 was the coldest maximum temperature there since 54 was recorded on Christmas Day in 1989. Other record lows in Florida on February 5 include 23 at Apalachicola, 33 at West Palm Beach, and 37 at Miami Beach. Record lows on February 6 include 21 at Gainesville, 23 at Jacksonville, and 30 at Lakeland. Locally, wind chill was very noticeable on February 5 with gusty north winds and a high temperature of only 52 at the Sarasota/Bradenton Airport.

Beneficial rains fell on the Sunshine State on January 29-30 with 0.95 inches at the Sarasota/Bradenton Airport, 1.05 at Parrish, 1.51 at Orlando, 1.88 at Tampa, and 1.93 inches at the St Petersburg/Clearwater Airport. Additional timely rainfall on February 2 included 0.60 inches at Parrish and 0.48 inches at the Sarasota/Bradenton Airport.

In other environmental news in the world, the official death toll from Australian wildfires reached 181 by February 10 with a possibility it will exceed 200. The wildfires outside Melbourne, Australia's second largest city, destroyed more than 750 homes, left 5,000 people homeless, and burned 1,100 square miles of land. Witnesses described seeing trees exploding and skies raining ash as temperatures hit a record 117 degrees in Melbourne on February 7 and combined with 60 mph winds to create perfect conditions for uncontrollable blazes. A long-running drought in the Australian state of Victoria, the worst in a century, has left forests extra dry. Police said they believed some of the fires were set deliberately.

Tree limbs snapped with a sound like gunshots, blacking out thousands of homes and businesses, and schools and government offices were closed on January 27 as a major storm spread a glaze of ice and snow from the Southern Plains to the East Coast. Ice had built up to as much as 3 inches in sections of Arkansas and Oklahoma. As many as 350,000 people were without power in Arkansas. It was even worse in Kentucky with over 600,000 homes and businesses without power. The governor of Kentucky stated that this was the biggest natural disaster in the history of Kentucky. Cleanup continued in Lone Grove, Oklahoma where eight people died in a powerful tornado on February 10.

Haiti: Neighbors Build Hope Project

The month of March highlights Living Lord Lutheran Church's Outreach Committee's Haiti Awareness and Support program of the Global Mission Committee, Florida-Bahamas Synod, ELCA.

The Lutheran World Federation, (LWF) participates in a network called ACT – Action by Churches Working Together. LWF is providing support for the emerging Lutheran Church in Haiti training pastors and teachers for churches and schools.

Because Haiti is the poorest country in the Western Hemisphere, Haitians live in abject poverty with barely enough to survive. Therefore, the churches in Haiti are a lifeline for the people.

Envelopes and information will be included in the bulletin on Sunday, March 1st, 2009. These envelopes (or checks designated Haiti) may be returned to the church office or placed in the offering plate any Sunday in March. Contributions can be earmarked for these programs:

Concrete Block Program
The Student Scholarship Program

The Theological Training Program
The Haiti Teacher Training Program

Emphasis this year is being placed on The Concrete Block Program. The Block Program is new and very important because it will help rebuild three churches that have been destroyed by hurricanes. These new concrete buildings will not only serve as a church, but, also a place for refuge during a storm and a community gathering and activity center. (The cost of each block and cement is \$20.00.)

On Sunday, March 22, 2009, we are pleased to have Patricia Hansen, of Ormond Beach, as a guest presenter. Ms. Hansen, who is an active volunteer with the "Neighbors Build Hope Project", has returned to Haiti ten times this past year working diligently to help the Lutheran Church and the people of Haiti. She will tell us more about the important work the Lutheran Church is doing in Haiti.
